

University of Colorado at Boulder

The Pre-Collegiate Development Program at the University of Colorado at Boulder is an institutionally funded academic enhancement program for targeted middle and high school students. It is designed to motivate and prepare first generation students in pursuit of their higher education goals. PCDP is structured to ensure that students are academically prepared to enroll and be successful at the University of Colorado or any postsecondary institution of the student's choice.

Purpose of the Program

- Provide academic enhancement strategies and opportunities
- Provide college/career exploration opportunities
- Provide leadership development opportunities
- Establish collaboration with parents, counselors, and community
- Provide parents with the tools to assist in the educational endeavors of their student

Eligibility Requirements

- Must attend a target high school or middle school
- Be a potential first generation college student (neither parent has a 4-year college degree)
- Minimum of a 2.75 Grade Point Average
- Parents must be an active partner and participate in Saturday Academies with their student (typically 3 per school year, usually 8:30 am-12:00 pm)
- Meet one or more of the following requirements: (a) be a member of a one-parent family, (b) be the eldest child in the family, or (c) have a strong desire to continue onto higher education

CU-Boulder Summer Residential Program

The program provides those students making the transition between their Junior and Senior year in high school with a Summer Academic Residential Program, which is held on the CU Boulder Campus. During this Residential Program, students are academically exposed to the following subject content areas, which are relative to a student succeeding at the postsecondary level: Mathematics, Engineering, English (Composition or Journalism) and College-Prep Seminar/Leadership.

During the summer, the students will meet with university representatives to aid in the planning of their college programs and transitioning into college. Through extensive and thorough academic advising, tutoring, and academic enrichment activities, students are encouraged to earn the highest possible grades which will prepare them for admission to the college or university of their choice. As a result, being exposed to a

positive academic environment will better prepare the Pre-Collegiate students to successfully compete at their choice college or university with other students and graduate on a timely basis.

Students will be given the opportunity to take part in one of two university courses – ARSC 1000 (writing) or Journalism 1871. Placement is based on the program administered assessments. If completed successfully, this course will allow the students to earn up to three (3) hours of elective college credit.

All classes are held in various University locations. Full utilization of all campus facilities is available to provide the best instruction (e.g. labs, audio-visual aid equipment, computer labs, library, etc.).

Brief Overview and Future Plans:

We continue to have successful Saturday Academies; over half of the 2008 summer students have been accepted to CU-Boulder, as we are waiting for the May 1st confirmation date. Currently, we are not definite on any future plans.



University of Colorado Denver

Mission Statement

The purpose of the University of Colorado Denver's Pre-Collegiate Development Program is to:

- provide high quality services to potential and current students;
- motivate and prepare first-generation college bound students to complete high school on a timely basis and enter post-secondary institutions with the necessary academic skills to graduate and complete a professional degree by supplementing secondary academic curriculum; and
- guide and provide services that assist students to transfer to the University with the appropriate academic requirements.

Selection Criteria

- Must attend a target high school or middle school
- Be a potential first generation college student (neither parent has a 4-year college degree)
- 2.50 Grade Point Average minimum
- Meet one or more of the following requirements: (a) be a member of a one-parent family, (b) be the eldest child in the family, or (c) have a strong desire to continue onto higher education

Pre-Collegiate Middle School Academic Program

The Pre-Collegiate Middle School Academic Program (PCMSAP) at the University of Colorado Denver, Downtown Campus is an academic enhancement program. This program is designed to adequately prepare potential first-generation (neither of whose natural or adoptive parent(s) received a baccalaureate degree) college students in grades seven and eight to successfully complete their pre-secondary school career, then enroll in a college preparatory high school curriculum. The ultimate goal is that they enroll in a college/university of their choice with the necessary skills and academic preparation to succeed at and graduate from that institution.

The Pre-Collegiate Middle School Academic Program serves as a precursor to the Pre-Collegiate Development Program (high school). Students who successfully complete the Pre-Collegiate Middle School Academic Program with a cumulative G.P.A. of 2.75 or better will then be admitted to the Pre-Collegiate Development Program at the end of their 8th grade year.

The Program will offer students the opportunity to engage in a wide range of Pre-Collegiate activities throughout the academic year. The academic year component will offer students monthly Saturday Academies consisting of basic study skills (e.g., effective note taking, time management, effective listening, organization, etc.), supplemental academic instruction, communication skills development, career exploration day, high school transition preparation, parent partnership workshops and a variety of cultural enrichment experiences.

Pre-Collegiate Development High School Program

The Pre-Collegiate Development Program, sponsored by the University of Colorado Denver, Downtown Campus, is an institutionally funded academic enhancement program for high school students. This program has been in existence on the Denver campus since January of 1988. The program's objective is to motivate and prepare first-generation students (grades 9 thru 12) who attend fourteen Denver metro-area high schools, to successfully complete high school on a timely basis and develop the necessary skills, then successfully enter and graduate from their choice post-secondary institution.

The Pre-Collegiate Development Program is designed to increase the number of first-generation secondary students who aspire to attain a post-secondary education. This is achieved by providing essential and timely academic advising, in cooperation with parents and high school guidance counselors, to assure a timely graduation and meet the students' desired successful admission to their choice college/university.

During the academic year students are provided with relevant Saturday Academies in such areas as: Basic Study Skills Mastery, College Entrance Exam Preparation, and Student Communications Workshops. Tutoring services are also provided on an ongoing basis throughout the academic year both at UCD and the student's high school.

In addition, these students are provided with either a two-week (sophomores) or five-week (juniors) intense Summer Academic Program. During this experience, students are exposed to various academic courses, which are designed to enhance and augment their college entry requirements (e.g., mathematics, writing, and the sciences) once they return to their host high school for either their junior or senior year. Students and their parents are clearly informed that there is a major difference.

Pre-Collegiate Heath Careers Program

The Pre-Collegiate Health Careers Program (PCHCP) at the University of Colorado Denver-Anschutz Medical Campus (AMC), is an academic, enrichment and support program designed to motivate first-generation college students (neither of whose natural or adoptive parent(s) received a baccalaureate degree) to graduate from high school successfully, complete a college preparatory curriculum, and pursue a college education leading to a career in a health care profession.

PCHCP offers students in grades 10 through 12 the opportunity to engage in a wide range of pre-college activities throughout the academic year. The academic year component provides students monthly Saturday Academies consisting of health career, study skills, academic and financial aid workshops.

Sophomores prior to the junior year participate in a two-week introductory academic program at the Anschutz Medical Campus. The two-week academic program includes a college preparation seminar, as well as sessions on health careers, creative writing, human anatomy, mathematics (Pre-Alg.-Pre-Calculus) and health disparities.

In addition, a five-week summer program for juniors prior to the senior year will be held on the Anschutz Medical Campus. This session consists of accelerated high school mathematics (Alg. 1-Calculus) and human anatomy classes, a three-credit English composition college course, along with cultural, social and recreational activities.

Mission Statement

To provide academic and financial support to middle and high school students who would be the first generation in their families to graduate from college.

Program Description

The Roaring Fork School District Pre-Collegiate program is an academic enrichment and support program designed to guide academically motivated middle and high school students and their parents to successfully complete their secondary school career, on a timely basis, and matriculate to a choice postsecondary institution with the necessary academic and interpersonal skills needed to succeed and graduate from that institution. It also guides parents on how to plan financially for college and how and where to apply for help. The program consists of three main components: Mentor Program, Saturday Academies, and Summer Academic Camp.

The mentor program is a year-long series of bi-weekly meetings that happen during the school day. Mentors are typically professionals from the community who know the importance of giving their time to positively influence young lives. The curriculum for these meetings include life skills, keeping abreast with current events, setting and coordinating community service, ACT preparation, personal goal setting, field trips, and guest speakers.

Saturday Academies cover: basic study skills, communication skill development, college entrance preparation and registration, career exploration, college fair visits, ACT preparation sessions, etc.. The Summer Academic Camps consist in a one-week residential program hosted at Colorado Mountain College for freshmen and sophomores, and a two-week long program at the University of Colorado at Boulder for juniors and seniors. During these weeks, students experience living on campus while being expose to the rigor of academic courses designed to augment their requirements in math, writing and another area upon their return to their host high schools.

The Roaring Fork Pre-Collegiate program has the following staff: a program director, an administrative assistant, and a board or directors. It also has 23 volunteer mentors. The program in its second phase provides services to 200 seventh to 12th grade students from the Roaring Fork Valley. So far, the program has been successful in the placement of its graduating seniors into higher education at a rate of 95 percent or above. All seniors enrolled in this program have graduated high school.

The program is a partnership between the Roaring Fork School District, the University of Colorado, Colorado Mountain College, and the Aspen Community Foundation, and takes its model based on the CU Boulder program with more than 25 years of Pre-Collegiate program experience.

Student Eligibility:

- Students are selected to participate in the program based on the following criteria:
 - o Roaring Fork School District Middle or High School student
 - Student would be a first-generation, college graduate in their family (neither parent received a baccalaureate degree); some exceptions apply to this rule.
 - o Minimum of a 2.50 GPA (grade point average)
 - o Be academically motivated
- In addition, the student could meet one or more of the following requirements:
 - o Come from a single-parent family
 - o Be the eldest sibling in the family, or
 - o Have a desire to continue her/his education beyond high school.

Roaring Fork Pre-Collegiate Program Graduation Rate:

100% high school graduation rate and 100% college enrollment in the past two years. Consistently, 40% of students have gone to the local Community College; 60% enroll at 4-year colleges or universities. It is anticipated that the number of students staying in Colorado will be greater this year due to the economy.

Host institution application rates

This year, 35% of our students have applied to the University of Colorado for admittance in the fall of 2009

CU admission & enrollment rates system-wide

In the past, all students who applied to CU from the Roaring Fork Pre-Collegiate were admitted. Only 7% of our students applied to CU last year, but the number this year is much greater and I anticipate that it will increase every year as we expose our students to the CU campuses more.

Post-secondary admission & enrollment rates by 4-year & 2-year institutions

All of our students are admitted into post secondary institutions. Consistently, 40% of our students decide to stay close to home and enroll at Colorado Mountain College. Our Pre-Collegiate students have a guaranteed scholarship of \$2,500/year for up to 65 credits. This covers pretty much all tuition and books for the year so it makes a lot of sense for first generation students to stay close to home. I don't have enough data to report the number of students who transfer to a 4-year university. I hope to have that data next year.

Funding for the Roaring Fork Pre-Collegiate Program comes from private grants and from the Aspen Skiing Company and the Aspen Community Foundation advisory fund. The director's salary and a ½ time administrative assistant are covered the Roaring Fork School District. The school district also provides in-kind donations such us office space, phones, office supplies and services, and tech support. The CU Boulder campus supports the summer program for two weeks. This includes paying all staff salaries, room and board, insurance and other activities outside the campus. Colorado Mountain College also supports a summer program for younger students for a week. All activities and scholarships provided to students come from grants and other sources of funding.
