What is Form 8843?

IRS Form 8843, Statement of Exempt Individuals and Individuals With a Medical Condition, is a required statement filed by F and J visa holders who are nonresident aliens per the <u>substantial presence test</u>. The form documents one's presence in the U.S. and the fact that the filer cannot yet count their days of presence in the U.S. toward U.S. tax residency.

It is not a tax return, and even nonresident F and J visa holders without U.S. income are required to file this form with the IRS.

Who is required to file Form 8843?

CU students and scholars, as well as their spouses and dependents, in F-1, F-2, J-1 and J-2 statuses are required to file Form 8843 for any year in which they are nonresident for U.S. tax purposes.

The <u>substantial presence test</u> should be used to determine your U.S. tax residency status but <u>generally</u> speaking:

- F and J student visa holders are considered nonresidents for their first five calendar years (including partial years) in the U.S.
- J non-student visa holders (researchers, scholars, teachers, etc.) are considered nonresidents for their first two calendar years (including partial years) in the U.S.

Do I need a U.S. taxpayer identification number to file Form 8843?

No. If you have previously been issued a U.S. Social Security Number (SSN) or Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN), however, it must be included on Form 8843.





How should I prepare Form 8843?

If you had no U.S. income and, therefore, are not required to file a tax return with your 8843, the International Tax Office recommends completing the form by hand (see line-by-line instructions, below).

You may alternatively purchase an individual software license to prepare Form 8843. This might make sense if you have an income tax return filing requirement but were not eligible for a software license from the University of Colorado or other U.S. institution from which you received U.S. income.

Available options include:

- Glacier Tax Prep
- SprinTax

When is the deadline for filing Form 8843?

The form is due by your deadline for filing income tax returns. If you are not required to file an income tax return or have any doubt of your tax filing deadline, the safest approach is to have your 8843 completed and in the mail prior to April 15.

- 1. a. Identify the visa status in which you most recently entered the U.S. and the date you first entered the U.S. on this visa.
 - b. In most cases, this is the same as the status you provided above, unless you have changed your status within the U.S.
 - If you changed your status within the U.S., identify your current immigration status and the status date of that change;
 - If you have not changed your status from above, identify the status again but do not provide a date.
- 2. Enter your country of citizenship. If you have dual citizenship, enter the country to which you have the closest connection.
- 3. Enter country issuing passport and number of most current passport.
- 4. a. Enter the actual number of days you were present in each of the years requested. Your I-94 travel history is available at https://i94.cbp.dhs.gov/ for reference.
 - b. Enter the number of days you were present in 2017 in an exempt status. Exempt status means that days of presence were not countable towards the <u>substantial presence test</u>. If you were present in more than one immigration status, be sure to only include the days in exempt





status. Note that only time spent in F, J, Q, M, A, and G statuses are potentially exempt; days spent in ALL other status are not exempt.

This section must be completed by J-1 <u>non</u>-students and their J-2 dependents. J-1 researchers are included in this category.


- 11. Identify the type of visa (F, J, Q, or M) you held during the years requested. If your immigration status changed during the year and you have not obtained a new visa, you may attach a handwritten explanation to Form 8843.
- 12. If you can answer 'Yes' to this question, then you may be considered a tax resident for the year and not obligated to complete this form. You should refer to the <u>substantial presence test</u> to clarify your tax residency. If, however, you are claiming nonresident tax status because of a closer connection to another country, you will be required to attach a statement to Form 8843. You can read more about claiming a closer connection, <u>here</u>. The CU International Tax Office is unable to advise you on making a closer connection claim.
- 13. Answer, 'Yes' or 'No.'
- 14. Provide explanation, if you checked 'Yes' on line 13.

How should I submit Form 8843?

Double check that you have completed all required fields, make a copy for your records and mail each individual 8843 to the address below.

If you had no U.S. income and, therefore, are not required to file a tax return with your 8843 mail the completed form to:

Spouses or dependents sending an 8233 without a tax return should submit their 8843 in a separate envelope.

If you are filing a U.S. income tax return, file Form 8843 with your 1040NR or 1040NR-EZ.
