## 2 LAWS OF THE REGENTS

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- 7.A.1 The goal of the degree admissions process is to identify individuals with qualifications that indicate a high probability for degree completion. Admission is based on evidence of scholarly ability and accomplishment, general level of academic performance before admission to the university, and motivation and potential for academic growth, and ability to work in an academic community.
- 7.A.2 The university reserves the right to deny admission or readmission to applicants whose credentials reflect an inability to assume those obligations of performance and behavior deemed essential by the university and relevant to any of its lawful missions, processes, and functions as an educational institution.
- 14 7.A.3 University admission policies shall comply with state law and the policies of the Colorado Commission on Higher Education.

## 16 Part B: Standards of Conduct

- 7.B.1 Each campus shall establish standards of student conduct and processes for determining violations and any subsequent sanctions. See Regent Policy 7.B.
- 19 Part C: Academic Freedom
- 7.C.1 The core principle of free inquiry and discourse is recognized by the Board of Regents
  as academic freedom. For students, academic freedom pertains to their course
  discussions, course assignments, and scholarly work.
- 7.C.2 All members of the university community have the right to free expression as stated in Article 1.E of Regent Law and further elaborated in Regent Policy 1.D; however, this right is distinct from academic freedom.
- 7.C.3 In any course, students shall be free to discuss topics or ask questions related to the
  course, provided that students follow applicable campus policies and reasonable
  procedures established by the instructor to ensure orderly discussion and progress
  toward class and course goals. See Regent Policy 7.C.
- 30 7.C.4 Students should be evaluated solely on academic performance, according to the published requirements established by the instructor or academic unit.

Part D:	Student Government
7.D.1	On each campus, the students shall be represented by a campus student government organization that reports to the chancellor.
7.D.2	Each campus student government organization shall operate in accordance with a constitution that defines its governing structure and principles. The constitution is subject to approval by the chancellor.
7.D.3	An Intercampus Student Forum shall serve as the universitywide student representative body for communicating with the president and the Board of Regents. The Intercampus Student Forum shall assign a spokesperson to address the Board of Regents.

57 58 59		(C)	Students, faculty, or administrators shall not be bound to decisions made under conditions of coercion or intimidation, or where force and violence are present or threatened.

66 67 68		(C)	After the suspension period has expired, a student who has been suspended is eligible to reapply for admission to the campus imposing the sanction or any other University of Colorado campus.

71 72 73		(E)	The university may withdraw financial assistance, regardless of form, and deny university employment to students who have been sanctioned for violating standards of conduct.

## Policy 7.C: Academic Freedom

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## 76 7.C.1 Associated Rights 77 (A) During a class discussion, students shall be free to raise questions and express 78 reasoned opinions on the current subject, provided that students follow 79 applicable campus policies and reasonable procedures established by the 80 instructor to ensure orderly discussion and progress toward class and course 81 goals. 82 (B) During faculty office hours, students shall be free to question, discuss, and 83 express reasoned opinions on all subjects related to the course. 84 (C) Students shall be free to take reasoned exception to the views or the methods of 85 data collection, analysis, and/or interpretation of data offered in any course of 86 study. 87 (D) Students should have protection, through orderly procedures, against prejudiced 88 or capricious academic evaluation. 89 7.C.2 Associated Responsibilities 90 (A) As members of the campus scholarly community, students shall strive to attain 91 the standards of academic performance established for each course in which 92 they are enrolled. 93 (B) Academic freedom notwithstanding, all students shall comply with standards of 94 conduct, and with any reasonable procedures for classroom discussion 95 established by the instructor. **Policy 7.D: Student Government** 96 97 7.D.1 Governing Documents 98 (A) A campus student government constitution shall be submitted to the chancellor 99 for review and is subject to the chancellor's approval. It may then be ratified by a 100 vote of the student body. 101 (B) Proposed amendments to a campus student government constitution shall be 102 submitted to the chancellor for consideration and approval. The action of bringing 103 the matter to the student body for a vote shall be subject to chancellor approval. 104 The chancellor's approval to conduct a vote shall not be interpreted as an 105 endorsement of the proposed amendment, but shall indicate the chancellor's acceptance of the outcome of the vote. 106 107 7.D.2 Student Government Organizations and Operations 108 The administration and the campus student government organization shall (A) 109 develop an operating agreement that establishes the role of student government

110 111 112		in managing student government-funded activities and in developing or reviewing campus policies relevant to student issues. The agreement shall not interfere with faculty control over academic policy.
113 114 115 116	(B)	Student government organizations shall conduct their affairs in a manner that is consistent with campus policies and procedures, the laws and policies of the Board of Regents, and the laws of Colorado. No undue constraints shall be placed upon student government operations.
117 118	(C)	The operations and budgets of student government organizations are subject to auditing in accordance with Board of Regents fiduciary oversight responsibilities.

120 121 122	(A)	Should a dispute arise between a student government organization and the chancellor that cannot be resolved, the student government organization may appeal to the president.
