





Fall 2020 to Fall 2024








Statewide Total Enrollment












Statewide Resident Undergraduate Enrollment












Fall Retention Rates (First-Time, Full-Time)

Cohorts Fall 2019 to Fall 2023










4-Year Graduation Rates (First-Time Freshman)

Cohorts Fall 2016 to Fall 2020










6-Year Graduation Rates (First-Time Freshman)











FY 2024-25 Resident Tuition & Fees Compared to Peers






Number of Aid Recipients

FY 2020 to FY 2024













Student Financial Aid: Federal Pell Grants

Federal Pell Grants, the largest source of federally funded grants, are awarded solely based on financial need (academic grades and extra-curricular activities aren't a factor). Recipients must meet general federal student aid eligibility requirements. The maximum Federal Pell Grant award for the 2024-25 academic year is \$7,395.

Pell Recipients at CO 4-year Public Institutions (IPEDS 2023)









FY 2020 to FY 2024











Faculty Population | Retention + New Hires










% Total Faculty Retained by Campus

FY 2019-20 to FY 2023-24

















Illustration below represents the share of Operating (Education & General) budgeted expenditures. In FY 2024-25, CU System approved operating budget was \$2.1 billion. Tuition and fee revenue makes up 65% of the operating budget, followed by 18% state funding, and 17% other E&G.







History of CU State Funding










Undergraduate and Graduate Share of the Cost of Education, based on cost per student FTE







Awards by Type (% Annual Change & Total in millions) FY 2020 to FY 2024







About the CU Foundation




Age of Buildings Stock



Colorado Congressional Districts Since 2023




